CIBER Advisory Board Meeting Beneficial Exchange



Professor Cavusgil welcomes the Advisory Board

On March 23, the CIBER Advisory Board met in MSU's Kellogg Hotel and Conference Center for an update on the activities of MSU-CIBER and to exchange ideas for future projects, improvement of current ones, and issues on the education of students both on campus and in eLearning.

Dr. S. Tamer Cavusgil, Executive Director of MSU's CIBER, opened the meeting with a warm welcome and an introduction of each member. After brief comments from Associate Dean Elvin Lashbrooke about the dean's search in The Eli Broad College of Business and the progress on the new Executive Development Center, Dr. Patricia Paulsell, Director of Business Languages, MSU CIBER and Associate Dean of the College of Arts and Letters, opened up discussion with the group about foreign languages for business. She stressed the need for business languages since the traditional high school and college language courses emphasize reading literature.

Dr. Paulsell mentioned that business Chinese and Russian have been dropped because of under enrollment.

German and French are experiencing low enrollment, which is reflecting the trend in high schools.

Some of the resources coming from CIBER efforts are; a video called "Language-Doorstep to Opportunity" for students and parents to view, a CD Rom for Mandarin Chinese and a new virtual resource center that incorporates useful sites on the web for specfic languages. The German site is publicly available and the Spanish site will be completed this summer. Also, an advanced level textbook (on business languages) has been written in 4 volumes, and is highly regarded and widely used.

Two new faculty members shared with the board their research efforts in international business. Dr. Frank Rothaermel, Department of Management, presented his unique view as a person born and raised in Germany and now working in the U.S. He mentioned the opportunities in the U.S. and his research on why some firms succeed while others fail. Dr. Brent Adamson, Department of Linguistics and Languages, filled the board in on his research which focuses on helping businesses and business students understand the cultures of other countries.

Dr. Adamson also mentioned a new study abroad program to Germany and a work abroad program in Stuttgart, Germany. The board members agreed that study abroad experiences for students is an important aspect of their education and has tangible benefits in the business world.

Dr. Bruce Magid, Director of MSU Global, described the initiatives that MSU is taking in the eLearning field. He feels MSU will be a global leader and that CIBER and The Eli Broad College of Busi-

ness will have a major role in implementing groundbreaking programs.

Dr. Tomas Hult, International Business Center Director, posed the question: What makes MSU unique? It has one of the premier CIBERs in the country, produces top scholarly leaders in international business, and has a website that gets 900,000 hits a month, reaching out to businesses and academia nationwide. The meeting ended with a demonstration of the alpha version of globalEDGE, a new global knowledge web portal. Michael Reed, Systems Analyst, demonstrated the various features and gave an overview of what will be available on the site. Irem Kiyak, Assistant Director, International Business Center, spoke about the need for the knowledge portal and fielded questions about it.

The Advisory Board then engaged in a brainstorming session about the new eLearning initiatives of MSU-CIBER, including the proposed Global Management Certificate program, scheduled to be launched next fall.

The meeting adjourned with all feeling the goal of the meeting was accomplished and it was a beneficial interchange between the business community and CIBER. Thanks to all those who worked hard to make the meeting a success!

Study Abroad Scholarships



MSU-CIBER is proud to report that it has awarded scholarships to some 40 Broad College students, in support of their participation in summer 2001 Study Abroad programs. A total of \$11,500 was awarded, with individual scholarships ranging from \$200 to \$500. The winners were selected from a pool of over 70 applicants. Non federal funds were used for these scholarships.

Scholarship winners will be participating in a variety of Study Abroad programs, including "Doing Business in Mexico," in Monterrey, Mexico; "Studies in the Global Marketplace," in London, England and Dublin, Ireland; Czech Republic, Ireland and the Netherlands; "Business Internship," in Istanbul, Turkey; and "Business in Norway! Service Management: The Scandinavian Approach," in Stavanger, Norway.

MSU-CIBER offers study abroad scholarships on a competitive basis for qualified business students going abroad on Fall, Spring, or Summer Semester programs. Applications are available in the International Business Center, Room 7, Eppley Center. March IB Forum Focuses on Canada



John Lang, Consul and Senior Trade Commissioner, Canadian Consulate General of Detroit, discussed the mutually beneficial relationship that Canada and the U.S. have as economic partners at the International Business Forum in March. Consul Lang discussed economic trading and investment opportunity in Canada in his presentation, "The Canada-U.S. Economy: A Study in Integration."

Mr. Lang began by explaining what the consulate does. It promotes trade and helps small Canadian companies do business in the U.S. It also protects and advances Canadian interests and builds awareness of Canada and Canadian values.

He went through the very different histories of the U.S. and Canada. The U.S. fought a war for freedom, but Canada just evolved. The U.S. has many checks and balances, but Canada has a Prime Minister who has the authority to call an election. Mr. Lang showed his good humor when he said that in the last election in Canada the ballots were counted by hand in just 4 hours.

Linda J. Truitt is a shareholder practicing in Butzel Long's Detroit office. She is a graduate of Madonna College in 1982 and Detroit College of Law in 1988. Ms. Truitt's primary concentrations are in employer sanctions, labor certification and both immigrant and nonimmigrant visa matters for U.S. and foreign businesses. Prior to joining Butzel Long, Ms. Truitt was an associate at another major Detroit law firm, where her practice was concentrated in the area of immigration law. Ms. Truitt is a member of the Michigan Bar Association, the Detroit Metropolitan Bar Association and the American Immigration Lawyers Association.

Her presentation "Immigration Law in the 21st Century" gave detailed information on immigration laws and how they affect employers, foreigners, and business travelers. Since U.S. immigration laws are complicated and the U.S. is the most difficult country to enter, this kind of information is important for anyone bringing someone from another country for work, either temporary or permanent and for those involved in international business travel.

Her detailed knowledge was appreciated by the audience.


Fall 2001 International Business Forum Schedule
